Dr. Alonza Lawrence

Dr. Alonza Lawrence, baritone, is a Postdoctoral Research Associate in Voice at University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign. Among his many accomplishments, he has served as the Associate Instructor for the African American Choral Ensemble of Indiana University, and as soloist for the Emmy award-winning “Amen, Music of the Black Church!” PBS concert documentary.

Dr. Lawrence’s work and research bridges the gap between Eurocentric and Afrocentric music practices. Since joining the voice faculty at U of I, he serves as a professor of voice, contemporary vocal performance, Gospel studies and as a vocal coach for the Lyric Theater.

Dr. Lawrence earned Doctor of Music and Master of Music degrees from Jacobs School of Music of Indiana University and a Bachelor of Music Education from Norfolk State University.

Dr. Jesse Ayers

African American spirituals constitute one of the largest and most significant repertoires of American folk music. Birthed in slavery, the spirituals were a means of solace and encouragement, combining Biblical promises with expressions of the hardships of slavery.

There's a Stirrin' in the Water resulted from a dinner meeting between Christopher Wilkins, conductor of the Akron Symphony Orchestra; Charles Myricks, Jr., a composer, pastor, and former executive at Word Records; and Jesse Ayers, an orchestral composer and university music professor. Wilkins proposed that Myricks and Ayers collaborate to create a work celebrating the spiritual.



Myricks writes, "I sought to renew our acquaintance with several well-known traditional spirituals, presenting them in a way that highlights their power to confront incredible hardship with divine defiance. The spirituals always reflected, renewed, and revealed a source of the strength of the slaves, their belief in a just, all-knowing, almighty, and loving God, who is willing and able to set captives free."

Ayers adds, "Chuck and I agreed from the outset that this piece needed to be more than an arrangement for chorus with orchestral accompaniment. We wanted an integrated symphonic fabric of equally important players—the orchestra, the chorus and the soloist. We included a range of emotions found in the spirituals, from songs of sorrow, to songs of sustaining faith, to songs of victory and praise. Chuck shaped the order of songs to form the work's arc."

Near the end, as the chorus repeatedly sings "Glory and Honor," the listener will hear several *glissandi* from the horn. This is a direct reference to the shofar or ram's horn trumpet described in Leviticus 25, to be sounded once every 50 years to announce the Year of Jubilee, in which all debt was canceled and all indentured servants were set free.

The work also has several quotes from Dvořák's Symphony No. 9, *From the New World*. Dvořák was heavily influenced by a young African American student he heard singing in the halls at the National Conservatory in New York City.

That student was H.T. (Harry) Burleigh, who became one of the foremost arrangers of spirituals. It seemed fitting to the composers of the present work to "complete the circle" by including phrases and harmonic progressions found in Dvořák's *New World*.
